



About ACSO

Established in 1983, ACSO is one of Victoria's leading community support organisations with a reputation for helping some of the most marginalised clients; those not generally welcomed or able to be supported by other services due to their behaviour, complex needs and/or offending history. Through a diverse range of programs, provided throughout Melbourne metropolitan and regional Victoria locations, we strive to achieve our purpose of making a difference in the lives of disenfranchised people and enable them to create another chance. ACSO delivers more than 20 programs to approximately 20,000 disadvantaged clients every year.

ACSO's Intensive Housing Support services provides a "step up, step down, step out" model of support for our clients, which includes intensive forensic and specialist disability supported accommodation programs, and community based outreach services which are all designed to address behaviour change, build residents resilience and confidence, adaptive living skills and independence. These services include the state wide Francis House program, a transitional Dual Disability service, and post release support housing programs for offenders re-entering the community from prison.

ACSO's Clinical services promotes a therapeutic and rehabilitative environment within all of ACSO's programs, and specifically includes the following clinical services:

- The specialist state wide forensic intake, triage and Drug & Alcohol Assessment service
 COATS program;
- Therapeutic, psychosocial treatment programs for residential and community based clients:
- Specialist behaviour change programs for problematic sexual behaviour and clinical risk manageability.

ACSO's Community Based Complex Care services provides support for clients living independently in the community and includes a number of specialist outreach, case co-ordination and case management programs for clients with multiple and complex needs, including: offenders; people with mental health; dual disability; forensic disability; intellectual disability; homelessness and long term unemployment.

"As the new CEO I am inspired by our Council, their passion for ACSO, their commitment to governance and the strategic vision they have set for us to follow."



Catch Me

Autumn is a time for change - not just encouraging people to change, but changing ourselves and the systems around us to help this to happen. This is how the CATCH program came to life. The ACSO team were spending a lot of time in court, and observing the many complex individuals walking in and out of court rooms with often limited assistance to make any sustainable changes. Their charges weren't always serious enough to bring them to the attention of justice programs, and their needs were too complex to label under mental health, disability or housing. These people were falling through a gap, over and over again, and we were in a position to do something about it.

"As a worker, establishing the CATCH program has been a blind leap from what seemed a pretty comfortable cliff – leaving an established team and caseload behind to launch a brand new set of systems and processes in an unfamiliar environment. There is an old idiom along the lines of 'the only constant in the universe is change', and I am so glad that ACSO is doing their all to keep up with the changing needs of clients and stakeholders."

RESTORE focuses on the needs of the families who have been impacted by complex forensic issues of their loved ones including impacts on their mental and emotional health, financial, and / or physical wellbeing providing families with emotional support, networking with health professionals, and advocacy.

U-R Amazing

"Being offered the Scanners R Us position changed my whole world. I hadn't worked since before my children were born and being given the chance to work in an office at this stage of my life was a welcome gift and an opportunity that I thought would never be available to me.

To me I was a widowed single mother with a really bad criminal history with a drug history as well. As far as I was concerned, no-one would ever employ me to work in their company let alone give me a position of responsibility and trust. Now I was being offered a position that required complete confidentiality, responsibility and trust all in one. I wasn't only responsible for myself but others as well. I had been disheartened for so long thinking that even with an education that I might never be employed because of the stigma associated with my criminal and drug histories.

After my work experience I have been blessed with the opportunity to work with ACSO, which is wonderful. Each morning that I was working, my youngest son Kyle and I would walk together to the tram station and then he would continue on to school. **Before I started working, Kyle had very little interest in his schooling but this all changed with the start of me working.** Kyle now has something to be really proud of, his mum working for the first time in his life that he can remember.

My life now has goals and dreams for the future. I see myself in the future obtaining a university degree and for the first time in my life become employed and actually love working. Working in the field of your choice is really fulfilling and an amazing feeling. For me it is quite a difference to want to go to work and be involved in work activities. I have always wanted to work in an office, but have never obtained the correct skills to be in the field that I love. Working at ACSO provides me with stability in my life. For the first time in years I can take my sons out on activities on week-ends and truly enjoy each other as a family. **My life has totally changed!!**"

ACSO's Employment Services won a "roll over" JSA contract ensuring we support more people to achieve similar amazing life changes that Nicole has done.





When Harry met Annie

A young guy called Harry approached ACSO for an opportunity to do some volunteer work. He had worked in an advocacy role for people with mental health problems and he was keen to get into case management and support services with offenders. Harry was given an opportunity to work in our Link Out program mentored by a senior member of the team. Link Out addresses long term behaviour change ultimately leading to a reduction in recidivism.

A major part of our success has been the great team we employ. Harry quickly proved to be an asset to the team and within a couple of months we offered him a full time job. Harry epitomises what ACSO is all about: an enthusiastic, non-judgemental, smart, effective and kind young man respectful of the needs and complexities of our clients and willing to do what it takes to create another chance.

A Safer Place

Fostering innovation in our work is not new to ACSO. In the 1990's ACSO pioneered work with sex offenders, led by Sister Claire McShee, working in a space that no one else wanted to. It was a brave risk that ASCO took with the view that if this group were released into the community they had a better chance of rehabilitation and our community would be safer with our strong support.

"We (staff of the Sex Offender Support program) have often fielded tough questions as to how, or in fact why, we could do the job that we do. The answer is simple – appropriate supports for offenders reduce risks of recidivism and makes the community a safer place. The job is tough at times, but it's important if you want to make a difference to be able to take risks – something ACSO has done from the very beginning."

These past 20 years has seen us work effectively with sex offenders and has not only provided ACSO with the skills necessary to manage the common risks and issues of this offender group, but also the capacity to address the wide range of complex needs and compounding factors that are often present as additional risks. **Most importantly it's our aim to ensure the community is safe from harm.**

Recently, ACSO accepted a young man into one of our specialist residential programs. During the intake process, it became clear that he would require us to wrap all of our support and expertise around him. Presenting with a mild intellectual disability and paranoid schizophrenia, he had frequently come into contact with the Criminal Justice System for violent offences in the community.

As a specialist disability services provider approximately 55% of our clients present with cognitive impairments including learning disabilities and ABIs



Through support provided by our multi disciplinary team and the staff at the Disability Justice Unit he was assisted to increase his community participation, engage in pro-social recreational activities and work towards attaining his goals. He made positive steps forward every day.

Today he has a casual job as a gardener, participates regularly in his chosen sports rugby and soccer, and has learnt new skills of independent living such as cooking and cleaning. He also got his learner's permit. Incredibly all these achievements were made within a time period of eight months.

As for the future? His goals include a full driver's and forklift licence and moving into independent housing. Most importantly not only has he not re-offended, he now has many reasons to keep going forward with his life.

"Significant numbers of offenders appearing before Magistrates in Victoria are affected by problems such as alcohol and/or drug dependency, homelessness, mental illness and a range of disadvantages. Appearing in Court is often a critical point of intersection in their lives and an opportunity for effective therapeutic and other interventions. Programs supported by ACSO (such as COATS) are able to provide, and have provided, services to offenders over many years with the aim of supporting them and in doing so reducing the risk of re-offending. The role ACSO plays in working with Courts and Community Corrections has been vital in the lives of many offenders and a significant support to the work of the Court in discharging its sentencing function."

Hope and Recovery

The Community Offender Advice and Treatment Service (COATS) is a state wide program providing assessment and treatment of offenders with a drug or alcohol issue in their lives. We aim to reduce the health risks, and the associated criminal impact that substance use has on an individual's life. It is a real opportunity to help explore these issues and start the process of making change.

In 2010 / 11 over 15,000 referrals were made to the COATS program with almost 9,000 people completing drug treatment programs right across Victoria.



At least 80% present with significant substance abuse issues and almost 90% of these have a mental health issue as well.
